9. FINANCIAL REPORT

The Treasurer C F Pretorius delivered the Audited Financial Report for 2018 (July 2017 – June 2018) and the comparison of the Treasurer’s Report.

Report can be obtained from the IMSSA Office.

C F Pretorius requested a proposal and acceptance of the Financial Statement for 2018.

- Acceptance of the Financial Statement for 2018 was proposed and seconded by F T Cawood and U C Pfafferott respectively.

E Ramzan stated that a permanent Treasurer to be appointed as elected by Exco.

Members at the AGM disagreed with an appointment of a permanent Treasurer.

K Schmidt stated that he visited the constitution and that the election of the new Treasurer was done in accordance to the constitution.

E Ramzan introduced the newly appointed Treasurer, D C Andersen who presented the budget for 2019.

D C Andersen:

- Annual financial year end will be reverted back to the end of the year, which is January to December. Genesis will need to restructure the AFS for 2017 and 2018.
- Over 1 million rand turn over for the past year making IMSSA VAT liable, which means that IMSSA would have to register for VAT, where IMSSA is currently VAT exempt.
A majority of the turnover is resulting from the income received from the major conferences – Geomatics Indaba and AfricaGeo. IMSSA will no longer be hosting conferences in conjunction with Geomatics Indaba and AfricaGeo, so as to avoid having to register for VAT.

D C Andersen presented the following proposals, and requested a seconder on the following items:

- Increase fees by CPI rate, is proposed by D C Andersen and seconded by C F Pretorius.

- New auditors to be elected – NMN Chartered Accountants, is proposed by D C Andersen and seconded by F T Cawood.
- Administration Manager's salary adjustment – a salary survey was conducted in comparison to South African Geomatics Council and industry. Members questioned the salary adjustment. F T Cawood proposed that the two issues (permanent Treasurer's appointment and Administration Manager's salary adjustment be taken back to Exco, ratified by Council and then be added to the budget.
- Acceptance of the budget for July 2018 to June 2019. F T Cawood and G A Mokhitli proposed and seconded the budget on condition that the 2 issues mentioned above are dealt with.

10. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The President E Ramzan presented the annual report.

Welcome

Good Morning and thank you for attending the 96th Annual General Meeting of the Institute of Mine Surveyors of Southern Africa.

A warm welcome to our members and to all who support and contribute to the wellbeing of our institute throughout the year.

We, IMSSA express our thanks to the delegates from other organisations who have kindly sacrificed of their time to be here with us:

Mr. Nape Mojapelo, Chairperson of the South African Geomatics Council (SAGC);

Introduction

Exactly a decade ago, the world was hit by the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Mining production in South Africa continues to decline and are unable to benefit from the current surge in demand for commodities.

Our country is hamstrung by several domestic challenges.

Policy and regulatory uncertainty.

Excessive bureaucracy.

Mature mines producing at the upper limits of the cost curve.

Safety and cost challenges of pushing the boundaries of mining further and deeper.

Labour uncertainty.

Infrastructure challenges – electricity, rail, ports.

Production disruptions due to safety shutdowns.

Global investors and banks increasingly reluctant to invest due to the inherent risks.

The Mine Surveyor plays an integral part towards addressing at least three of these challenges directly and possibly some of the others indirectly.

A modernised Geomatics capability should contribute to removing people from risk and improving mining efficiency.

Key aspects that survey can practically address, include:

Removing people from risk through the progressive introduction of remote sensing and unmanned vehicles in favour of traditional means of survey to garner spatial detail safer, faster and more accurately in inhospitable environments.

Effectively harnessing the vast amount of spatial data already generated by autonomous and semi-autonomous mining equipment or adapting equipment with appropriate sensors to dynamically update digital mine models.

Application of improved digital comply-to design graphic systems and real time analytics for more efficient decision making.

Exploring means to replicate surface technology such as GPS underground.

Spatial detail for emerging technology such as Digital Twinning – the virtual simulating of the physical environment to emulate field conditions and highlight bottlenecks and potential risks prior to operational execution.

A lot is already being done.

Industry and academia are working in collaboration to produce this future mine and mine surveyor. For the benefit of industry as well as the perseverance of the profession it is incumbent that we remain relevant in the advent of the Fourth Industrial Revolution.

Likewise, academics and industry are reviewing training and qualifications to equip future surveyors. Proudly IMSSA is contributing and playing their role in this too.

We need to be vigilant. Surveyors by their nature are generally loathe or over cautious about adopting new technology.

This has never been more critical than now, as new intuitive technology increasingly becomes mainstream.

It could be argued that these advances would jeopardise jobs.

To the contrary diligent, unsentimental scrutiny indicates that it is likely to produce more.

Mining areas previously inaccessible or uneconomical to mine due to distance, heat, safety and geotechnical considerations now become attractive;

New skill sets are required;

The Chamber of Mines 2017 Facts Report states that Modernisation could save around 200,000 jobs by 2030, affecting 2 million dependants.

Overview of the activities

General

First and foremost, I just wish to say a big thank you to all Council and Branch Committee members. These dedicated people voluntarily sacrifice time and effort to the institute and the profession. Likewise, I wish to extend our thanks on behalf of IMSSA to all our steadfast sponsors.

Following, I am going to talk through the highlights of work done by each of the Branches and subsequently by Council and its sub-committees.

Branch Reports

North West Branch

Despite challenges with reduced attendance to meetings the branch met the annual financial target. The branch with the ardent support of suppliers held three meetings inclusive of an AGM at different, interesting venues during the course of the year.

Members of the branch were encouraged to give presentations on new and current technical developments in their areas of operations and expertise.

Throughout the year educational and informative presentations were given by members, subject expert guests and sponsors.

Other initiatives driven include:

The recruitment of new members with special focus on young and upcoming professionals.

Encouraging members to participate in matters affecting their interests and careers including career development through education and exposure to technology.

Limpopo Branch

Likewise, the Limpopo branch with keen support from suppliers held three meetings of which two included mini colloquia.

The events were held at different, interesting venues throughout the year with their AGM scheduled for later this year.

Membership growth is of particular concern for the branch, with initiatives being explored to increase membership in future.

Mpumalanga Branch

The branch has reconciled and consolidated historical financial reporting. Appropriate processes have been put in place to ensure financial prudence.

The branch is furthermore pleased to report having achieved the annual financial target.

Several strategic initiatives have been identified and implemented to address medium to long-term objectives of the branch:

Encouraging the younger members to be actively involved in the structures of the institute at the Branch level and subsequently council.

Encouraging members to present technical papers.

Creating healthy cross commodity professional engagement to enable a broader knowledge base (e.g. students writing the MSCC to have exposure to other commodities).

Finding innovative ways to grow the branch both in terms of members and financially.

The Branch Chairman and committee wish to thank all the companies that have sponsored and supported the Branch Meetings.

Particularly acknowledging current economic pressures and the challenging business environment the unwavering support is well appreciated.

Free State Branch

Significant work has been done by the branch committee in raising awareness amongst members and subsequently becoming the single biggest branch in terms of financial contribution to council.

The Free State branch also held three successful meetings with the steadfast sponsorship and support from suppliers.

Committee Reports

Public Relations committee

Thanks to Committee Chairman Mr. Alex Bals and the PR committee members for their effort in managing this portfolio.

AGM 2019

It is expected that next year's AGM will be in the usual IMSSA format, held at a venue away from Johannesburg, concurrent with a colloquium and a day of presentations.

Gauteng IMSSA Technical Forum

The afternoon format doesn't work for non-Johannesburg residents. Proposals have been made to incorporate the technical bits into the Branch meetings and have the Jhb residents do the networking at will – this the Institute can assist with. Since own events are more profitable than industry events we must not lose the opportunity to arrange these events/colloquia.

President's Cup 2018

The golf day was successful i.t.o. attendance, sponsorship and finances. A profit of R24 016 was made, according to the Treasurer's report dated 19 July 2018, on costs of R78 954 and revenue of R102 970 (P/R = 23%). This places our golf day at a similar level of profitability as industry events, for less money and more fun. For President's Cup 2019 the Krugersdorp GC is provisionally earmarked.

Botswana Branch

No update yet, we will follow up with the BW Branch committee as to proposed new dates, however I expect that at best we will be targeting Q1/2019, accompanied by a Botswana technical tour, similar to the Lesotho technical tour in Q4/2017.

General: Facebook page

We encourage our members to visit and like our Facebook page. We received a like from one very prominent person. We received a like from President Cyril Ramaphosa.

Education committee

Thanks to Committee Chairman Mr. Donovan Andersen and the Education committee members for their effort in managing this portfolio.

Book Sales and Stock Levels

Book sales have been relatively consistent with the Sales amounting to R167 190 from the sale of 182 books.

Stock Levels are adequate (461 books) with the exceptions of Practical Geostats: 2000 and Case Study. Additional Print Runs are to be ordered.

Book prices are to be raised to align with similar text books.

Royalties were paid to I Clark after a 5 year period.

Survey Drafting Certificate:

A three year GIS Diploma offered through ESRI was proposed and accepted by the Education Committee as a replacement for the COM Drafting Certificate.

ESRI is accredited by SAGC to provide this qualification.

Further details will be published on the website.

DMR - MSCC:

The Industry Advisory Committee is to be reconvened; one of its tasks will be to compile a proposal on qualification criteria to replace the MSCC.

A meeting will be arranged with the DMR to present the proposal.

Minerals Council:

Deadlines for the transition to the Certificate and Diploma have been extended to 2020 with last registration in 2022 for exams.

Technical committee

Thanks to Committee Chairlady Miss. Thabitha Machaba and the Technical committee members for their effort in managing this portfolio.

Promotional video

The IMSSA survey promotional video is underway. Some shaft sinking footage was taken at Venetia mine.

Opencast and underground mine footage is scheduled at Grootegeluk and Lonmin Marikana mines respectively. Material covering the academic environment will be taken at UJ and Wits University.

Business Membership

This membership category was established to cater for parties wishing to distribute notices via the IMSSA email list and website.

A comprehensive review is being done on its viability as well as other revenue streams.

Review Membership categories

All membership categories are being reviewed to reduce any ambiguous criteria. This is particularly necessary to appropriately cater for applicants with qualifications from outside of South Africa.

IMSSA Website

Digital Cloud is busy with a 2nd phase of the website upgrade which involves creating and setting up:

A facility for user registration and updating of membership detail; and

A facility to order textbooks;

The anticipated date for testing is end of May.

Exco Strategy

Finance

Three key policies were compiled by D Andersen:

An Investment Policy was completed and submitted to Council in 2017.

A Bursary Policy was submitted to Council on in August 2018.

A Finance Management Policy was drafted in August 2018 and submitted to Council.

Succession Planning

A policy is being drafted detailing eligibility for election to Exco.

Firstly, Nominees should be members that have been active on branch committees.

Thereafter nominees need to be monitored and mentored to ensure they meet relevant eligibility requirements for progression to fill the President role.

Part of this is a structured matrix of fulfilling active roles in the council sub committees.

For the 2018-2019 year:

C Pretorius stated that he will be stepping down as Senior VP, due to the change in his work status. Subsequently the following structure was proposed and ratified, E Ramzan remains as President for another term. G Mokhitli moves up to Snr VP.

After a nomination and voting process, L Koorsse was elected as Jnr VP.

Education

Covered under Education Committee

Professional StatusSAGC

During this year SAGC has resolved internal governance matters and has implemented a system of segregation of duties and has appointed a representative management committee overseeing the routine running of the business. However, the Council members have asked the Council to request the Minister to remove the Chairperson from his appointed position, as he had been deemed not fit for duty.

Three members of Council resigned during the year, Mr John Kotze (SAGI), Adv. Vusi Pikoli (Protector of the Public) and Mr Mark Schreiber (Hydrographic Society). A request for nominations has been sent to the Minister for publication. It should be noted that in terms of the Notice in the Gazette all other members' term of office is until 14 April 2020.

The Act has made day to day management of the Council onerous, as it has vested wide-ranging powers to the Minister. This was an issue highlighted by the industry at large, and IMSSA in particular, when the public comment was requested. The Council has requested the Chief Surveyor-General to engage the Minister in order to delegate authority to subordinates to ease matters.

The Council has engaged a professional law firm to draft relevant policies to guide the working of the Council. The focus will be on procurement, recruitment and labour management, educational funding, protection of personal information and various other legal matters.

Various disciplinary matters brought to the Council via complaints from the public were dealt with. The most common complaint is that of non-registered persons practising work, but it must be noted that the Council has no criminal disciplinary powers of non-registered practitioners. It can merely assist in a civil court case. Other complaints centred around non-performance, or perceived overcharging.

The Education Advisory Committee has resumed its duties with vigour and will be conducting academic accreditation visits to 13 academic institutions, during the months of September and October 2019, which will include the three institutions relevant to mine surveying, namely UJ, UNISA, and the ESRI Academy.

SAQA

Mine Surveyor, Associate Mine Surveyor and Professional Mine Surveyor designations are registered. C Bennett has drafted further designations that will include a Mineral Resource Manager and other categories within IMSSA.

Samcodes Standards Committee (SSC)

It must be noted that IMSSA is now firmly considered to be a member of the SSC in its own right. Leon Koorsse has replaced Jurgens Visser as IMSSA representative to the SSC.

Clause 49 of SAMREC will be deleted. This clause references the national standard for reporting of coal resources and coal reserves (SANS 10320). The national standard allows discounting of

resources and reserves to an extent unacceptable to SAMREC. The SSC is deliberating whether to write its own Code for the reporting of coal resource and coal reserves and will seek industry guidance on the matter.

The SAMCODES (SAMREC, SAMVAL, SAMOG, SAMESG) are available on a mobile app, which has been sponsored by participating professional bodies, of which IMSSA and SAGC were the first to participate. The app allows professionals as well as members of the public to access the codes online from any device.

The SSC has been pursuing the publication of its efforts through workshops, interviews with industry magazines and newspapers. Extensive workshops were held throughout the country during 2018, and future marketing efforts will be aimed at investors rather than practitioners.

The SSC has presented the Junior Squirrel Award at the JSE, which recognises the best annual report in the category of companies with a market capitalisation of less than ZAR15m. The 2018 winner was Royal Bafokeng Platinum.

Feedback was provided from international engagements where countries were pursuing the introduction of mineral codes. Two countries visited were Kazakhstan, by Matt Mullins, and Saudi Arabia, by Alex Bals. Both countries remain in contact with the SSC for guidance. A large Chinese delegation comprising senior government officials will be hosted by the SSC in South Africa in October 2018.

An international SAMCODES conference will be arranged for the second week in September 2019, to coincide with the CRIRSCO (international umbrella body for mining codes) meeting.

The issue of copyright was discussed and if the SAMCODES needs to have copyright. However, that would introduce the requirement of oversight on infringement and the costs associated with the process. The matter is still being debated and awaiting for the legal opinion prior to being circulated.

New Technology

The Industry Advisory Committee is to be reconvened to advise Industry, Education and Council of new technology on the horizon.

Its mandate is to propose a streamlined progression route to achieve alignment between academic qualification, industry competence and statutory certification.

She then returned to mining during November 2008 where she served as a Senior surveyor at Shanduka Coal. She left Shanduka Coal in 2009 for Sasol Mining where she is currently working at Brandspruit Colliery.

Gaopi holds a National Diploma in Mine Surveying and NhD in Mineral Resource Management from Witwatersrand Technikon; she also holds a Graduate Diploma in Engineering and a Master's Degree in Engineering from the University of Witwatersrand; she recently got her Post Graduate Diploma (PGDIP) in Business Administration and is currently completing her Master's in Business Administration (MBA) at the University of Pretoria, GIBS.
